Dear friends

To all my friends ...

ave you ever wondered why the date of Easter changes every year? It is because the date is not determined by the sun like our calendar but by the Jewish calendar which is governed by the moon. This is necessary because it corresponds to the Jewish Passover festival (Jesus died at Passover).

The Jewish Passover commemorates the Jews' escape from slavery in Egypt after the Angel of Death had killed the Egyptian firstborns. The Jews did not suffer any losses because they had sacrificed lambs and put the blood on their doors as a sign to the Angel of Death to "pass over" their household. You can read the whole story in Exodus chapter 12.

Those sacrificed lambs gave the Jews salvation from death and slavery. Jesus died at Passover because he was the "lamb of God" offering salvation from slavery of sin to all humanity. He died so that we can be forgiven and have eternal life.

Throughout Holy Week we shall remember his passion (which means suffering in this context) in the special services on offer around the plurality. There will be a devotion hosted by Stainton's Mother's Union, a Stations of the Cross meditation at Hilton, another Maundy Thursday commemoration in the context of a fellowship meal at Brookfield, a Good Friday united service at St Clare's RC and Good Friday reflections in all three churches.

On Easter Sunday we shall celebrate the triumph of his resurrection which is not only a proof that his sacrifice was sufficient but also a sign that he has won the battle over evil.

I hope you can join us but, whether or not this is possible, I hope you all have a blessed Easter time.

ASK THE CURATE –

This month the series of an ABC of the C of E continues with the letter "M". If you have heard any terms which you did not readily understand please let Bill Dewing know and I will try to include it in the series.

MISERERE – A name given to Psalm 51, derived from the first word in Latin.

MISERICORD – The projection on the underside of a hinged seat of a choir stall, said to have been designed to provide support for those incapable of standing for long periods during services.
MISSAL – The book containing the words, rubrics and ceremonial directions for the celebration of the Holy Communion service. The term is usually only used in "catholic" churches where the service may also be called the "Mass".

MITRE – The liturgical head-dress and part of the insignia of a Bishop. The shape resembles tongues of fire representing the Holy Spirit. Two fringed lappets hang down at the back, which are residual ties to keep the mitre firmly on the head.

MIXED CHALICE – The practice of mixing water with wine in the Eucharist. This practice was widely used in the ancient world and is thought to have been the practice of Jesus at the Last Supper. The practice was generally used by the early church and was part of the rubrics in the First English Prayer Book of 1549, but disappeared in the revision of 1552. The practice was revived in the 19th Century largely as a result of the Oxford Movement.

MIXED MARRIAGE – a marriage between Christians of different religious alliance, especially when one of the couple is a Roman Catholic.

MODERATOR – In Presbyterian Churches the Moderator is the presbyter appointed to constitute the court and to preside over its proceedings.

MODERN CHURCHMEN'S UNION – An Anglican society founded in 1898 for the advancement of liberal religious thought. It seeks to uphold the comprehensiveness of the Church of Eng-

land and to maintain the legitimacy of doctrinal statements in accordance with modern science.

MONESTERY – The house of a religious community.

MONK – The word is popularly used of a member of any religious community of men living under vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. However, it is only properly applied to such men who also live in a community and for whom community life is an integral part of their calling.

MONOTHEISM – Belief in one personal and transcendent God; according to traditional Christian teaching it was the original religion of human beings, lost as a consequence of the Fall.

MONSIGNOR – An ecclesiastical title used in the Roman Catholic Church and attached to an office bestowed by the Pope.

MONSTRANCE – The vessel used for exposing the Eucharistic Host for veneration. Often especially in modern forms it consists of a frame of gold or silver rays in the centre of which is a receptacle with a glass window through which the Host may be seen. MONTH'S MIND – A requiem celebrated on the 30th day after death or burial.

MORAL PHILOSOPHY – The branch of philosophy which examines the goodness of human actions apart from any considerations derived from supernatural revelation.

MORAL THEOLOGY – The study of Christian character and conduct, which treats God as the single object and reward of human endeavour.

n most churches people attend you will always find a large cross standing usually near the altar or just in front of the sanctuary. It represents the original cross where Jesus was crucified and it was there that God allowed his perfect son to die for the sake of every wrong thing we have done, said or thought. On the cross Jesus finished the work that was required to save us from the death we deserve.

The sight of the cross causes me to consider what Jesus endured for us, before being crucified. He was flogged and spat upon; the soldiers hit him on the head with sticks and got down on their knees in mock worship. They tried to make him carry his own cross to the place where he would die but he was too weak from the brutal flogging and needed help, Simon from Cyrene was

pressed into service to carry the cross.

At Golgotha they hammered nails through his flesh to keep him on the cross when they turned it upright. Those wounds bore the weight of his body as he hung there. Six hours later Jesus took his final breath, there was an earthquake and the curtain in the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. When the centurion and his men who were keeping watch saw all what was happening they were filled with awe, and they said,




"Truly this man was the son of God"

St George – Patron Saint Of England



very nation has its own 'Patron Saint' who in times of great peril is called upon to help save the country from its enemies. St David is the patron saint of Wales, St Andrew of Scotland and St Patrick of Ireland - St George being the patron saint of England. But who was St. George, and what did he do to become England's Patron Saint? Very little is known about St. George's life, but it is thought he was a high ranking officer in the Roman army who was killed in around AD 303. It seems that the Emperor Diocletian had St.

George tortured to make him deny his faith in Christ. However despite some of the most terrible torture even for that time, St George showed incredible courage and faith and was finally beheaded near Lydda in Palestine. His head was later taken to Rome where it was interred in the church dedicated to him.

Stories of his strength and courage soon spread throughout Europe. The best-known story about St. George is his fight with a dragon, but it is highly unlikely that he ever fought a dragon, and even more unlikely that he ever visited England, however his name was known there as early as the eighth-century.

In the Middle Ages the dragon was commonly used to represent the Devil. Unfortunately the many legends connected with St. George's name are fictitious, and the slaying of the 'Dragon' was first credited to him in the 12th century. St. George, so the story goes, killed a dragon on the flat topped Dragon Hill in Uffington, Berkshire, and it is said that no grass grows where the dragon's blood trickled down! It was probably the 12th century Crusaders however who first invoked his name as an aid in battle. King Edward III made him the Patron Saint of England when he formed the Order of the Garter in St. George's name in 1350, and the cult of the Saint was further advanced by King Henry V, at the battle of Agincourt in northern France. Shakespeare made sure that nobody would forget St. George, and has King Henry V finishing his pre-battle speech with the famous phrase, 'Cry God for Harry, England and St. George!'

King Henry himself, who was both warlike and devout, was thought by his followers to



possess many of the saint's characteristics.

In England St. George's Day is celebrated, and his flag flown, on his feast day, April 23rd. An interesting piece of trivia -Shakespeare was born on St. George's Day 1564, and if the story is to be believed, died on St. George's Day 1616. An appropriate end perhaps for the man who helped to immortalise the Saint in English tradition.

Three unexpected and unplanned bills hit Stainton Church's finances in the first quarter of 2017.

- 1). Sometime last Autumn we noticed that one of our large trees by the main gate was dead. An easy remedy you might think was to have it taken down on safety grounds.
- The Arborist agreed saying that the tree needed to come down while it was still safe to climb. But Stainton Church stands in a Conservation Area so permission had to be sought from Middlesbrough Borough Council. An application was made but after some delay was said to have been lost. A copy was sent which was dealt with swiftly and permission was granted. Now we needed permission from the Diocesan authorities.

As we moved into Winter with each weather forecast that said 'gale force winds' we wondered if this was the day Stainton Village might be blocked by a fallen tree. At the end of February with all the paper-work in place at last, the tree was taken down. What a relief! It was found to have been in a worse condition than we had known.

Along with some other tree work the bill came in at £1,040.

2). Water running down the inside walls of the Nave prompted us to check the rain gutters and hoppers. Leaves often fill the gutters and are regularly cleaned out, but this time it was found that we had the added problem of small tree saplings growing in 2 of the hoppers.

While the Roofer was checking he noticed that what he called 'Lead Rats' had been at work. Although no Lead was missing it was displaced enough to allow water ingress and had to be fixed.

To complete the work several 'slipped tiles' needed to be replaced. **Cost £1,050 3).** While we were preparing February's Parish lunch the wall mounted water boiler blew it's top. With a loud crackling noise and sparks leaping towards the ceiling, the kitchen was filled with black smoke and the shrieking of the fire alarms was ear-splitting.

We isolated the damaged boiler, ventilated the parish room, rang Colin to come to reset the fire alarm and served lunch on time. The cost of a new boiler and fitting £479.92 TOTAL £2,569.92 – Now the Fund Raising begins.


