The Rev. Billy Graham passed away at the age of 99 on February 21, 2018

In his last interview in 2016 he said:-

“Someone asked me recently if I didn’t think God was unfair, allowing me to have Parkinson’s and other medical problems when I have tried to serve him faithfully.

I replied that I did not see it that way at all.

Suffering is part of the human condition, and it comes to us all. The key is how we react to it, either turning away from God in anger and bitterness or growing closer to him in trust and confidence.”

A quote from his 9/11 Message at the Washington National Cathedral:

I’ve become an old man now. And I’ve preached all over the world. And the older I get, the more I cling to that hope that I started with many years ago, and proclaimed it in many languages to many parts of the world.”

The hope he speaks of so passionately, is the powerful message of Christ and the cross.

“The cross tells us that God understands our sin and our suffering, for he took them upon himself in the Person of Jesus Christ.

From the cross God declares, 'I love you.

I know the heartaches and the sorrows and the pain that you feel. But I love you. The story does not end with the cross, for Easter points us beyond the tragedy of the cross to the empty tomb.

It tells us that there is hope for eternal life, for Christ has conquered evil and death and hell.

Yes, there is hope. When we come to the end of ourselves, we come to the beginning of God.”

- “Being a Christian is more than just an instantaneous conversion – it is a daily process whereby you grow to be more and more like Christ.”

- “We are the Bibles the world is reading; we are the creeds the world is needing; we are the sermons the world is heeding.”

- “There is nothing wrong with men possessing riches. The wrong comes when riches possess men.”

- “Take one day at a time. Today, after all, is the tomorrow you worried about yesterday.”

- "God has given us two hands, one to receive with and the other to give with."

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

The Masters Tournament, also known as The Masters or The US Masters, is one of the four major championships in professional golf. Scheduled for the first full week of April, the Masters is the first major of the year, and unlike the others, it is held at the same location, Augusta National Golf Club, a private course in the South Eastern United States, in city of Augusta, Georgia.

The Masters was started by noted amateur champion Bobby Jones and investment banker Clifford Roberts. After his grand slam in 1930, Jones acquired the former plant nursery and co-designed Augusta National with course architect Alistair Mackenzie. First played 84 years ago in 1934, the tournament is an official money event on the PGA Tour, the European Tour, and the Japan Golf Tour. The field of players is smaller than those of the other major championships because it is an invitational event, held by the Augusta

National Golf Club.

The tournament has a number of traditions. Since 1949, a green jacket has been awarded to the champion, who must return it to the clubhouse one year after his victory, although it remains his personal property and is stored with other champions' jackets in a specially designated cloakroom. In most instances, only a first-time and currently reigning champion may remove his jacket from the club grounds. A golfer who wins the event multiple times uses the same green jacket awarded upon his initial win (unless he needs to be re-fitted with a new jacket).

Since 1960, a semi-social contest at the par-3 course has been played on Wednesday, the day before the first round.


Nicklaus has the most Masters wins, with six between 1963 and 1986. Palmer and Tiger Woods won four each, and five have won three titles at Augusta: Jimmy Demaret, Sam Snead,

Gary Player, Nick Faldo, and Phil Mickelson. Player, from South Africa, was the first non-American player to win the tournament, in 1961; the second was Seve Ballesteros of Spain, the champion in 1980 and 1983.

The Augusta National course first opened 85 years ago in 1933 and has been modified many times by different architects. Among the changes: greens have been reshaped and, on occasion, entirely re-designed, bunkers have been added, water hazards have been extended, new tee boxes have been built, hundreds of trees have been planted, and several mounds have been installed. Until 1983, all players in the Masters were required to use the services of an Augusta National Club caddie, who by club tradition was always an African American man. Indeed, club co-founder Clifford Roberts is reputed to have said, "As long as I'm alive, golfers will be white, and caddies will be black. Since 1983, players have been allowed the option of bringing their own caddie to the tournament Unlike other golf tournaments the Masters requires caddies to wear a uniform consisting of a white jumpsuit, a green Masters cap, and white tennis shoes. The surname, and sometimes first initial, of each player is found on the back of his caddie's uniform. The defending champion always receives caddie number "1": other golfers get their caddie numbers from the order in which they register for the tournament. The other majors and some PGA Tour events formerly had a similar policy concerning caddies well into the 1970s; the U.S. Open first allowed players to use their own caddies in 1976. Only three golfers have won the US Masters golf tournament two years in a row. On April 10th



2016 it appeared that

22 year old Jordan Spieth would become the fourth, but he faltered on the back nine holes and finished in a tie for second,

Despite this disappointing loss, Spieth was gracious towards the tournament champion, Danny Willett, congratulating him on his victory and the birth of his first child, something "more important than golf"

Writing in a national paper the columnist said "It takes grace to see the big picture so soon after having to sit through a trophy ceremony and watch someone else have his photograph taken,

Spieth's ball striking was off in that final round but his character remained unscathed."

Paul urged the followers of Jesus in Colossae to "be wise in the way you act towards outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, and seasoned with salt so that you may know how to answer everyone."

As those who have freely received God's grace, it is our privilege and calling to demonstrate it in every situation of life – win or lose.


