The influence of the Holy Spirit

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life It is only by love that we can keep the greatest commandments: "Love the Lord your God" and "love your neighbour as yourself".

Love is the greatest gift God can give. First Corinthians 13 says that love is patient, love is kind, and love never fails. God desires to show his perfect, selfless love to a world that is routinely confused about what true love is. God's children are the conduits of His love, as they are empowered by the Holy Spirit.

The fruit of the Spirit is what God desires our lives to exhibit and, with the Holy Spirit's help, it is possible!

One of the primary purposes of the Holy Spirit coming into a Christian's life is to change that life.

The Spirit-filled Christian has a peace that is abundant, available in every situation, and unlike anything that the world has to offer.

God is patient, and His Spirit produces the fruit of patience in us. When we are patient, we leave room for God to work in our hearts and in our relationships. We lay down our schedule and trust in God's. We thank the Lord for what and whom He's brought into our lives. We let God be God.

When we exhibit the kindness of God, we are tender, benevolent, and useful to others. Every action, every word will have the flavour of grace in it. To maintain this attitude toward those we love is hard enough. To express kindness toward those who are against us requires the work of God. That is why kindness is a fruit of the Spirit.

Goodness is not a quality we can manufacture on our own. "Every good thing given and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father. This certainly includes a life characterized by goodness. In letting the Holy Spirit control us, we are blessed with the fruit of goodness.

Faithfulness is believing that God is who he says he is and continuing in that belief despite the vagaries of life, that means we trust what God says in the Bible, and not necessarily what the world or our own eyes tell us. We trust He will work out everything for good. We trust He will work His will in us. And we trust that our situation on earth is nothing compared to our future reward in heaven. The only way we can have such faith is by the Holy Spirit's influence. He testifies to the truth and impels us to seek God. The Spirit makes us faithful.

Jesus gave us the perfect picture of gentleness: "See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey" and now He offers us His gentleness as a gift. If we allow the Holy Spirit to lead us, we will be filled with fruit of gentleness.

God wants us to give Him control of our lives. Relying on our own logic, we have no impetus to submit to God's leadership. With the wisdom given to us by the Holy Spirit, however, we begin to see why we should completely submit to God as Lord of our lives.

The fruit of the Spirit is the change in our character that comes about because of the Holy Spirit's work in us. We do not become a Christian on our own, and we cannot grow on our own. "it is God who is at work in us, both to will and to work for His good pleasure." Every good thing we do is the fruit of the Spirit's work in our lives.

11th June is the feast day of St Barnabas Who was St Barnabas?

The Acts of the Apostles describes Barnabas as 'a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith'. He was born in Cyprus of Jewish parents who called him Joseph, but when he sold all his goods and gave the money to the apostles in Jerusalem, he was given a new name: Barnabas, which means 'son of consolation' or 'man of encouragement.' Although Barnabas was not among the original Twelve, he is traditionally thought to have been among the 72 commissioned by Jesus to preach; so he is given the honorary title of Apostle.

Barnabas lived with the earliest Christians in Jerusalem. He was one of the first to welcome Paul, the former persecutor of the early Church. He persuaded the Christians of Jerusalem to accept Paul's claim that he was now a believer in Jesus.

Barnabas was sent to Antioch, to investigate the community of non-Jewish believers there. He brought Paul there from Tarsus. It was in Antioch that the followers of The Way were first called Christians. With Paul he took a donation from the church in Antioch to the Christians in Jerusalem during a famine.

With his cousin John Mark, and Paul he returned to Antioch and from there they set out on the first missionary journey of the Christian church. They went first to Cyprus, Barnabas' native land, and for this reason Barnabas is honoured as the founder of the Cypriot Orthodox Church. They journeyed on to Perga, where they were violently opposed by the Jews, then in Iconium they were stoned out of the city and they fled back to Antioch.

A dispute arose about the observance of the Jewish laws and customs, so Paul and Barnabas returned to Jerusalem to the council that decided that non-Jews would not have to be circumcised to be baptised. When they returned to Antioch, Acts of the Apostles tells us, "There arose a sharp contention between them. Barnabas took Mark with him and sailed away to Cyprus" Paul chose a new ally, Silas, and went elsewhere to strengthen the churches. Little more is heard of Barnabas though it is believed that the rift with Paul was healed.

Tradition says that Barnabas preached in Alexandria and Rome, and was stoned to death at Salamis about 61 AD.

Names from the Bible

JUDITH

Is from the Hebrew name meaning "woman from Judea", Judea being an ancient region in Israel. In the Old Testament Judith is one of the Hittite wives of Esau. This is also the name of the main character of the apocryphal Book of Judith. Judith was a heroine who saved her people by killing Holofernes, an invading Assyrian commander, by beheading him in his sleep. As an English name it did not become common until after the Protestant Reformation, despite a handful of early examples during the Middle Ages. It was however used earlier in Europe, by several European royals, such as the 9th-century Judith of Bavaria.

DAVID

Was probably derived from Hebrew meaning "beloved". David was the second and greatest of the kings of Israel, ruling in the 10th century BC. Several stories about him are told in the Old Testament, including his defeat of Goliath, a giant Philistine. This name has been used in Britain since the Middle Ages. It has been especially popular in Wales, where it is used in honour of the 5th-century patron saint of Wales (also called Dewi), as well as in Scotland, where it was borne by two kings.

ELIZABETH

From the Hebrew name 'Elisheva' meaning "my God is an oath" or perhaps "my God is abundance". The Hebrew form appears in the Old Testament where Elisheba is the wife of Aaron, while the Greek form appears in the New Testament where Elizabeth is the mother of John the Baptist. Among Christians, this name was originally more common in Eastern Europe. It was borne in the 12th century by Saint Elizabeth of Hungary, a daughter of King Andrew II who used her wealth to help the poor. In medieval England it was occasionally used in honour of the saint, though the form Isabel (from Spanish) was more common. It has been very popular in England since the reign of Queen Elizabeth I in the 16th century. It has also been used in various spellings by many other European royals, including a ruling empress of Russia in the 18th century.

TIMOTHY

English form of the Greek name Timotheos meaning "honouring God", Saint Timothy was a companion of Paul on his missionary journeys and was the recipient of two of Paul's epistles that appear in the New Testament. He was of both Jewish and Greek ancestry. According to tradition, he was martyred at Ephesus after protesting the worship of Artemis. As an English name, Timothy was not used until after the Protestant Reformation.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH



uring a holiday in Paris my wife and I visited the Louvre, and a visit to the Louvre would not be complete without seeing da Vinci's famous painting of the Mona Lisa.

The big question surrounding this painting is "is she smiling?"

The Mona Lisa is a half-length portrait painting by the Italian Renaissance artist Leonardo da Vinci that has been described as "the best known, the most visited, the most written about, the most sung about, the most parodied work of art in the world". The Mona Lisa is also one of the most valuable paintings in the world. It holds the Guinness World Record for the highest known insurance valuation in history at \$100 million in 1962, which is worth nearly \$800 million in 2017.

The painting is thought to be a portrait of Lisa Gherardini, the wife of Francesco del

Giocondo, and is in oil on a white Lombardy poplar panel. It had been believed to have been painted between 1503 and 1506; however, Leonardo may have continued working on it as late as 1517. Recent academic work suggests that it would not have been started before 1513. It was acquired by King Francis I of France and is now the property of the French Republic, on permanent display at the Louvre Museum in Paris since 1797.

The subject's expression, which is frequently described as enigmatic, the monumentality of the composition, the subtle modelling of forms, and the atmospheric illusionism were novel qualities that have contributed to the continuing fascination and study of the portrait.

The painting was among the first portraits to depict the sitter before an imaginary landscape and Leonardo was one of the first painters to use aerial perspective. The enigmatic woman is portraved seated in what appears to be an open loggia with dark pillar bases on either side. Behind her a vast landscape recedes to icy mountains. Winding paths and a distant bridge give only the slightest indications of human presence. The sensuous curves of the woman's hair and clothing, are echoed in the undulating imaginary valleys and rivers behind her. The blurred outlines, graceful figure, dramatic contrasts of light and dark and overall feeling of calm are characteristic of da Vinci's style. Due to the expressive synthesis that da Vinci achieved between sitter and landscape it is arguable whether Mona Lisa should be considered as a traditional portrait, for it represents an ideal rather than a real woman. The sense of overall harmony achieved in the painting especially apparent in the sitter's faint smile reflects the idea of a link connecting humanity and nature.

Whatever the sitter's identity, the influence of the Mona Lisa on the Benaissance and later times has been enormous? The Mona Lisa revolutionized contemporary portrait painting. Leonardo's preliminary drawings encouraged other artists to make more and freer studies for their paintings and stimulated connoisseurs to collect those drawings. Through the drawings his Milanese works were made known to the Florentines. Also, his reputation and stature as an artist and thinker spread to his fellow artists and assured for them a freedom of action and thought similar to his own. One such painter was the young Raphael, who sketched Leonardo's work in progress and adopted the Mona Lisa format for his portraits.

The 'smile' is part of the intrigue of the painting. But how important is this anyway? Is smiling something the Bible mentions? In reality the word appears only five times in the scriptures and never as something we are told to do. However, the Bible does suggest to us an attitude that leads to smiles – and that word is Joy.

Nearly 250 times we read about Joy: "My heart leaps for Joy" David says as he thinks about the Lord. We are to "sing joyfully to the Lord": Gods statutes are "the joy of our heart" and we are "filled with joy" because "the Lord has done great things for us"

Clearly, the joy God provides through everything he has done for us can bring a smile to our face.

The sense of a Goose

hen you see geese on their annual migrations flying in a "V" formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily, because they are travelling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stay in formation with those people who are heading the same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies at the point position i.e. at the front.

It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

What message do we give when we honk from behind?

Finally – and this is important when a goose gets sick or injured and falls out of the formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies; and only then do they launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their own group.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by each other like that.

Daisy Chain was established as a charity in 2003 as the dream of its founder, Lesley Hanson, whose son Jacob was diagnosed with autism at an early age. Although Jacob's condition was not severe, Lesley soon became aware of the problems faced by the parents and carers of children who were higher on the autistic spectrum.

Lesley dreamt of a haven for children with autism; a place where they could go to experience something in life that would give them pleasure and was especially for them.

It would also provide parents, carers and siblings with support and a resource library.

Disgruntled with the lack of facilities and services available to support families, Lesley and her husband Duane set off on a quest to make her dream become a reality. After extensive fundraising, the door to Daisy Chain opened one year after her initial dream and it has continued to grow ever since. Now, many years later, the charity helps 2054 families in the Tees Valley;

supports 322 children with autism each week and supports 42 adults with autism each week.

Second Calling

In her book SECOND CALLING, the author L.Savard tells of a time years ago, when she attended a conference. When it was over, she had arranged for her friend to give her a lift to the airport. As they were about to leave, another man asked if he could join them. As they drove away from the hotel, they asked the stranger where he worked, and he mentioned a Christian organisation. The friend who was driving said, "I have fond memories of that group, because I attended a retreat of theirs at one time, and that's where I became a Christian. He told of his journey of faith since that time and when he had finished the story the stranger quietly said, "I led that retreat. It was my first time as a conference leader, and I felt like a total failure. Until this moment, I have always believed it was one of the biggest failures of my life." "What had seemed like the simple act of offering a lift to a stranger had turned into a powerful reminder that God uses our efforts whether we realise it or not.

We may spend the rest of our lives doing things that don't seem at all successful. Yet only God knows the purpose. We are called simply to be faithful."

The author concluded 'There will be times when we may feel like a failures in what we are doing but we are called Just to be faithful. It's not our job to figure out if what we do (or what we did in the past) matters. That's the work of the Spirit. Our job is to do our part. Doing what we are called to do is the point'

"It is required of stewards that a person be found faithful." (I Corinthians 4:2)
