Take time to reflect

THE digital age has great advantages. Through e-mails, texts and tweets we can communicate quickly. The disadvantage is that it doesn’t cultivate us in a desire to think about things deeply. You can’t microwave personal growth; it requires a slow cooker.

The bible says “in the day of prosperity be joyful, but in the day of adversity consider; surely God has appointed the one as well as the other.”

By taking time to reflect:-

1. You gain confidence in decision making.

Ever made a snap decision and later wondered if you did the right thing? Reflective thinking can help to defuse that doubt. It also gives you confidence for the next decision. Once you have reflected on a decision, you don’t have to repeat every step of the thinking process when you are faced with it again. You’ve got mental road markers from having been there before.

2. You clarify the big picture.

Reflective thinking encourages us to go back and spend time pondering what we have done and what we have seen. To keep from making the same mistake over and over again you must stop and examine the process that led to it, in other words, reflection helps you see the big picture.

3. You take a good experience and make it a valuable experience.

They say that we learn by experience, no we learn from evaluated experience. An experience becomes valuable when it informs and equips us. That is why daily prayer and bible reading are so essential. You will understand things in God’s presence that you won’t understand any other way.

Hymn Stories (3 of 3)

Rev'd John S. B. Monsell

*Fight the good fight with all thy might;
Christ is thy Strength and Christ thy Right;
Lay hold on life and it shall be
Thy joy and crown eternally.*

JOHN Samuel Bewly Monsell, born in Ireland in 1811, was educated at Trinity College, Dublin, graduating in 1832. His first post was as curate of Templemore, Derry (1834-1836), and, after holding a number of ecclesiastical positions, including vicar of Egham, Surrey, he became rector of St Nicholas's Church, Guildford, in 1870, and Chaplain to Queen Victoria (1870-1875).

He was a prolific poet and hymn writer, publishing eleven volumes of poetry and approximately three hundred hymns. His books included *Hymns and Miscellaneous Poems* (1837) and *Litany Hymns* (1870), but he is best remembered for the hymn *Fight the good fight with all thy might* which first appeared in 1863. Only this and three of his other hymns are still sung today.

Despite the first line, this hymn is not a Christian battle-song in the style of *Onward Christian Soldiers* or *Soldiers of Christ arise*. Rather, it is a call to faithfulness. Each of the verses is based on a verse from the Epistles. The first echoes 1 Timothy 6:12, "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life." The second, with its athletic connotation, follows Hebrews 12:1, "Let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us."

*Run the straight race through God's good grace,
Lift up thine eyes and seek His face;
Life with its way before us lies,
Christ is the Path and Christ the Prize.*

The third verse is from 1 Peter 5:7, "Cast all anxiety on him, for he cares for you"; and the fourth from Colossians 3:11, "Christ is all, and is in all."

Monsell believed that hymns should be enthusiastically sung and full of joy. He wrote: "We are too distant and reserved in our praises." In 1875, whilst supervising the rebuilding of St. Nicholas Church, Guildford, he slipped and fell from the roof, and died shortly afterwards from his injuries.

Our Church Family

Harry Norris is St Margaret's oldest member. In his 98th year he is still active and is a gentleman in every sense of the word.

This is his story:-

I was born in 1921 in Union Street Middlesbrough and attended Fleetham Street School and then Hugh Bell Central. My first job was in the purchasing department of Pease and Partners, a local steel works, where I remained until volunteering for the RAF in 1940. I became an aircraft fitter, with postings to squadrons in the Isle of Man, France, Canada, Egypt, and finally Arabia. I was demobbed in 1946.

During these years I worked on most of the wartime planes i.e. Spitfires, Hurricanes, and Lancaster bombers, and then the newly constructed Mosquito, and then to go on and fly in them. It was a most unforgettable experience.

I returned to my old firm as assistant to the works manager, and then to the account's department. During my time there I was the captain of both the cricket and football teams, playing in the local leagues.

I married my wife Marjorie, (who had served in the WRNS) in 1948, and we were blessed with two children (Alan and Deborah).

At that time I began studying for an accountancy qualification, and moved to ICI where I remained until my retirement in 1980. I then spent most of my spare time as treasurer for various charities.

Marjorie and I then decided to spend the next few years on world travel; sadly I lost Marjorie in 2013 after almost 65 years of a happy marriage.

I then joined groups promising gentle exercise, use of the gym, carpet bowls, and social outings, and I am currently treasurer of one of these groups.

Two years ago I was awarded the Legion d'Honneur for services during the war, and in that same year was invited to the Queen's garden party in Buckingham Palace which I attended with my daughter.

(The **Legion of Honour** (full name: **National Order of the Legion of Honour**; French: Ordre national de la Légion d'honneur) is the highest French order of merit for military and civil merits, established in 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte and retained by all later French governments and regimes.)

My involvement with St Margaret's church began years ago when I was treasurer for the scout group. I later became a member of the PCC and joined the gardening team and have been a church cashier for many years. I have always held a strong belief in the Christian faith and hope that it continues to influence me.

Agatha Christie's "Poirot" The Clocks

FOUR clocks surround an unidentified corpse in a blind woman's house, and a young typist is summoned to the crime scene. However, Poirot is convinced that the complicated setup is merely hiding a simpler solution.


Investigating a spy-ring, Lt. Colin Race comes to Wilbraham Crescent, where he literally bumps into agency typist Sheila Webb, as she comes flying out of number 19, the home of blind receptionist Millicent Pebmarsh. Sheila has discovered the body of a man whose identity proves hard to confirm, surrounded by four clocks, stopped at the same time. Miss Pebmarsh does not know the man and did not ask for the services of Sheila, who is the initial chief suspect. However, as Poirot is brought in to assist Inspector Hardcastle in the case, the murderer strikes again, Poirot comes to realize that the man was killed elsewhere and brought to Miss Pebmarsh's house. The neighbours claim to have seen nothing but Poirot believes one of them may have had a secret which was worth killing for and sets out to unmask them, as well as explaining the significance, if any, of the clocks. At the same time, Colin solves his investigation with Poirot's help.

The Clocks features antagonists who commit a series of murders. Although their initial plot targeted a single victim, they began taking more lives in order to cover up



the original crime.

Like the schemers in this story, the religious authorities formed a conspiracy of their own. After Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead they called an emergency meeting to plot his death. But they didn't stop there. After Jesus rose from the dead, the religious leaders spread lies about what happened at the grave. When they began a man for the "greater good" of the nation became a web



of lies, deceit and multiple casualties.

Sin plunges us down the road that often has no end in sight, but God always provides a way of escape. When Caiaphas the high priest said, “ It is better for you that one man die for the people than that the whole nation perish”

he did not understand the profound truth of his words.

Jesus saves us from sins vicious grip. Have you received the freedom he offers?

The missing sponge

A surgeon was very selective with the people he wanted to work with. It was the first day on the job for a young nurse and the surgeon decided to issue a test. As the young nurse assisted the surgeon during a procedure, she noticed a problem.

“You’ve only removed eleven sponges, doctor,” she said to the surgeon. “We used twelve.”

“I removed them all,” the doctor declared. “We’ll close the incision now.”

“No,” the nurse objected. “We used twelve sponges.”

“I’ll take full responsibility,” the surgeon said grimly. “Suture!”

“You can’t do that!” blazed the nurse. “Think of the patient.”

The surgeon smiled, lifted his foot, and showed the nurse the twelfth sponge, and said, “You’ll do.”

It can be difficult to stand up for what is right, especially when we meet resistance. As for the young nurse, she was willing to risk disapproval and possibly even her job to stand up for what was right. Thankfully, she was working for a person who also valued integrity. It takes courage to expose ourselves and come under the heat of the spot light. In John 12:42-43, we see some people who weren’t willing to stand out, “Nevertheless many even of the rulers believed in Him, but because of the Pharisees they were not confessing Him, for fear that they would be put out of the synagogue; for they loved the approval of men rather than the approval of God.”

Which do we love more, God’s approval or man’s? It feels really good when people like us, praise us, and agree with us. Many people are even willing to sacrifice their morals and ethics in order to lay low and run with the crowd. It can be scary to be disliked, made fun of, and disagreed with. It can be hard to stand up for honesty and integrity as Christians, especially when those around us do not.

Moses told Joshua before his death, “Be strong and courageous, do not be afraid or tremble at them, for the Lord your God is the one who goes with you. He will not fail you or forsake you” (Deuteronomy 31:6).

People may dislike or disagree with us, but there is only one approval that really matters anyway, God’s. When we stand with God, God will stand with us. Therefore, no matter what other people may think, let’s be courageous Christians and pursue God’s approval above all others.



He used his expertise to negotiate with creditors, set up budgeting systems and offer a lifeline to those trapped in debt.

John knew that people all over the country were struggling in the same way and he began looking to replicate the work across the UK. With the vital ingredients of a Church to partner with, a passionate person to be trained as a debt counsellor and the faith that God would provide, four new CAP centres were opened at the end of 1998.

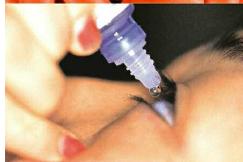
